### Synopsis



### About Director Zaid Abu Hamdan

Born and raised in Amman, Jordan, Zaid Abu Hamdan holds an MFA from the New York Film Academy in Hollywood California. Zaid started his career working on international TV shows as an Assistant Director and Producer, including E! Entertainment's coverage of the Golden Globe and Sesame Street. In addition, Zaid worked as a television reporter for Middle East Broadcast Corporation group (MBC Group) in Hollywood. He also worked on directing reality and scripted shows such as Sesame Street, a competition that shows and mentors the Arab Film Studio program at Image Nation, Abu Dhabi. Since 2009, Zaid has wrote and directed five award winning and audience acclaimed short films, including Bahiya & Mahmoud, which was the official Jordanian submission to the Academy Awards in 2012.





### Director's Statement

In 2001, I left my family and life in Jordan to explore the world, and pursue a career in film. I was eager to explore what is not my comfort zone and broaden my horizons.

Throughout the years, I discovered the home I was seeking outside Jordan, and learnt more about the world I left behind. I became more critical, more aware, and started to touch the imperfections in the place I loved. Ten years later in 2011, as I was presenting my awards to my proud mother, I found a desolate look in her eyes that was unsettling to me and hard to overlook. That day,

I realized that the woman I love most in life feels her own goals and dreams have been lost in the process of being an eldest daughter then a wife then a mother, or even being a woman in an Arab society. This awakening made me start observing traditions, analyzing behaviors, meeting women with different experiences, and earning their trust to hear their intimate stories of life, love and career, only to make one of my major discoveries, which is the desire of most of these women to scream.






### Director's Statement

Tradition and the need for social acceptance has always defined the Middle East and precisely Jordan. It's a patriarchal society that dictates the lives of women and men alike. Despite attempts by newer generations to overcome tradition, a part of us still feels safer with it, while the other part still aches to break free from it to thrive with freedom of life, love and expression. One question kept popping in my head, are we stuck in a cycle of oppressed women and programmed men? Why do we have this reputation of being angry? Being the eldest of four brothers, it made me wonder;

what if we were four sisters instead? I realized right then that this topic needs to be observed, frankly and transparently. Representing my idea in a family of 4 sisters and their father, I started writing the treatment of Nostalgia in 2009, which later became Daughters of Abdul-Rahman.While delivering a harsh reality to the silver screen, Daughters of Abdul-Rahman will still have that unique Jordanian sense of humor. I want to reflect the fun and loving nature of Jordanians that becomes a survival skill in the toughest of times, and a journey of very different women towards self-love. I hope this story touches the public in a positive way and reminds every woman and man out there that our happiness and our rights lies in respecting and loving ourselves, not in yielding to what "must be".





### About Producer Saba Mubarak

Saba Mubarak is a Jordanian actress/film producer whose filmography encompasses more than 60 works between cinema, TV and theater across the Arab world and Europe. Her production house, Pan East Media, presented remarkable works in Egypt and Jordan. Most recently, Saba focuses in her works on Arab women and refugees' issues. She was a jury member in several regional and international film festivals.





### Producer's Statement

People are born as a blank slate and very similar to each other, until the outside world starts forcing them (woman and men alike) to conform. I was captured by this project because I am an advocate for people being themselves and for individuality, and as a producer on this female centric movie my artistic role comes from a place of truth.

As a Jordanian woman, I lived with those characters and grew up with them. The characters Zaid created are familiar and relatable. While they grew up in the same house, family, and environment, they are totally different and throughout the film, each finds her unique voice. I love these characters despite their flaws, or what could seem as their weaknesses.


